Wright, York, and Reynolds, and
directs the design of such famous
instruments as the Studio line and
Mendez trumpets.

1839 BOSTON, MA

Elbridge G. Wright forms E.G. Wright & Co., pioneering the development of valved brass instruments.

1882 GRAND RAPIDS, MI

James W. York leaves Boston
Musical Instruments to found his
own company, gaining fame for
developing what would become
the gold standard of tubas and
other brasswinds. Later at York,
Foster A. Reynolds masters the
art of fine brass craftsmanship.



1936 CLEVELAND, OH

After his time at York and many subsequent years at the H.N. White Company, where he perfected valve design, Foster A. Reynolds founds his own company, which also builds instruments for service bands during the Second World War under government contract.

1960 FULLERTON, CA

Zigmant Kanstul assumes oversight of F.E Olds & Son design and manufacturing, later taking over operations at Benge and optimizing their production of professional instruments, including the renowned Claude Gordon model.



1981-TODAY ANAHEIM, CA

Zigmant Kanstul establishes Kanstul Musical Instruments, building fine brasswinds both under his own name and for venerable marques like F. Besson. Owing to his legendary experience and the knowledge gained from previous master brasswind makers, Zig has been called "the last of the great masters." Kanstul now builds the most extensive line of brasswinds in the industry, from instruments used by pro concert and studio players to a full line of marching brass, often working with top players to design custom instruments for specialized use.
